2022 was a year to remember! We have always believed that our region was poised for greatness, and now is our time. The quality of people and place, coupled with regional collaboration from Mobile's leaders in business, government, nonprofits and education, allowed us to rise to the challenge. When historians look back on 2022, it truly will be seen as the beginning of Mobile's golden age.

The stage was set when last March, Alabama's congressional delegation steered more than \$1 billion to Mobile. The spending bills directed more than \$600 million for new ships at Austal USA, \$300 million for port, airport and rail improvements, and \$60 million for construction at USA's College of Medicine.

In 2022, the Port of Mobile, with an \$85 billion impact, was named the fastest growing container terminal in the United States over the past five years.

A groundbreaking was held for the Mobile International Airport. This new airport, which is expected to open in 2025, will shift commercial airline operations from west Mobile to a location that is minutes from downtown and in closer proximity to major interstates and our downtown and industrial base.

Speaking of aviation, Airbus announced the addition of a third Final Assembly Line, putting Mobile on track to become the fourth largest city for commercial aviation in the world.

Austal continues to grow by leaps and bounds. Last spring, it opened its new steel line, which has proven to be transformative. Steel shipbuilding will ensure its ability to continue to grow jobs and support the 314 suppliers in Mobile that directly and indirectly help sustain 15,000 jobs in the state.

All of that culminated with the December announcement that the I-10 Mobile River Bridge and Bayway project will become a reality, resolving what has become the worst bottleneck on the I-10 corridor.

With continued growth in jobs and investments and third-party business rankings for "Best Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) Strategy," "Best Business Climate," and "Top 20 Seaport Communities," Mobile has become a globally significant player in multiple industry sectors.



Over the past year, our work expanded through the addition of 287 new members and 49 new Partners for Growth investors. Of the more than 1,600 Chamber members, 95% are small businesses with fewer than 100 employees. We recognize the importance of nurturing our small and existing businesses that are the engine of the Mobile area's job growth. Through programs and seminars as well as the addition of our Business Development Navigator, we connect small businesses to resources to help them grow and prosper.

As we kick off our 187th year, we are thankful for each of you – leaders who have embodied the Chamber's purpose of creating economic prosperity by facilitating community leadership.

Never has Mobile held such promise. Together, let's seize this

2022 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT HIGHLIGHTS

Evonik announced plans to build a plant on-site to produce methyl mercaptan, which is used to manufacture its MetAmino (DL-methionine) product. Methionine is used in livestock farming to feed animals in a healthy and sustainable manner. The site currently receives raw materials from third-party suppliers to produce methionine. The new plant is scheduled to come online in the second half of 2024. The project will strengthen the Mobile site and set it apart as a global, best-in-class methionine hub for reliable and cost-optimized supply to markets in the Americas.

DC Safety, a first-aid kit manufacturer for the automotive market, is relocating its manufacturing operations from upstate New York. The company will be the first tenant of the South Alabama Logistics Park. This 1,300-acre master-planned industrial park will be home to warehousing, logistics and light manufacturing operations.

Averitt Express is moving from its existing facility on Rangeline Road to a new operation at the South Alabama Logistics Park. Existing employment will be retained, and additional jobs will be created due to this investment to support the anticipated growth.

Austal USA cut the ribbon on its new, state-of-the-art steel manufacturing facility in April. The addition of the steel shipbuilding capability complements the company's well-established aluminum shipbuilding expertise. With the \$100 million investment, Austal constructed a new 117,000-square-foot manufacturing facility, a 60,000-square-foot stock yard, and a 19,500-square-foot paint facility. In June, Austal announced a \$3.3 billion multi-ship contract for the U.S. Coast Guard offshore patrol cutter.

Airbus Americas announced plans to expand their current facility at the Mobile Aeroplex at Brookley. The project represents the addition of a third Final Assembly Line to support increased production of Airbus' A320 family of single-aisle passenger aircraft. An estimated 1,000 new jobs will be created with this expansion.

APM Terminals will be expanding their dock operations at the Port of Mobile. After the Alabama Port Authority prepares the project site, APM will locate two ship-to-shore cranes (bringing the total ship-to-shore crane count to six cranes).

Canfor Southern Pine will be developing a new state-of-the-art sawmill for manufacturing and processing wood products in Axis, off Highway 43. The new sawmill will be replacing the company's existing facility in Mobile. The new facility is expected to produce 250-million board feet per year, resulting in approximately \$85 million annually brought into the community through local expenditures.

Topgolf, a leading golf entertainment venue with more than 70 locations, announced plans to build a multi-story complex at McGowin Park. The Mobile location will be the third in Alabama and is expected to open in late 2023.

Great Southern Wood is expanding the existing Great Southern Wood Treatment facility in Mobile County. The project is estimated to cost approximately \$13.7 million and create at least 12 new jobs paying a weighted, average wage of \$23.94 per hour.

International Business

In an ever-complex global marketplace, consuls generals, ambassadors and senior trade officials put Mobile at the top of the list for visits and conversations with business leaders. The Deputy Consul General and Senior Trade Policy Advisor from the British Consulate General in Atlanta traveled to Mobile in 2022 for a two-day visit to learn more about our region's dynamic business climate. In April, Ash Miller, the senior political and economic relations officer at the Consulate General of Canada, visited Mobile where he had briefings with the Chamber, the Mayor and city officials.

EXISTING INDUSTRY

Local businesses are the backbone of our economy. It is generally recognized that 70–80% of new jobs and capital investment come from companies existing within a community. When businesses succeed, we all succeed, which is why the Mobile Chamber is committed to retaining and expanding local companies.

As businesses increase their impact in our local community and in their industry at large, the Chamber is proud to assist them with retention and expansion initiatives aimed at maintaining their momentum. Whether it's access to local workforce education programs and training grants for companies expanding their hiring; entrepreneurship support, workshops, and networking opportunities; introductions to other local companies to build customer/supplier relationships; information on incentives for expanding operations; assistance with site selection for companies looking for a new location; or data for decision making, the Chamber is standing by to assist your company in reaching its full potential.

Sector Councils

The Mobile Chamber created Sector Councils to promote targeted industry clusters. MAST Alabama, which stands for McIntosh, Axis, Saraland, Theodore, is a 60-mile industrial corridor through Mobile County, representing approximately 25 specialty chemical manufacturers. MAST events held in 2022 included a presentation on sustainability initiatives, various lunch meetings and a luncheon hosted by the University of South Alabama President Jo Bonner on university partnerships, internship placements and research opportunities. The MAST platform is also used in business attraction for complementary industries suited to the area's available sites.

International Workboat Show

The Chamber welcomed 80 guests to its second annual reception at the International Workboat Show, a trade event in New Orleans attended each year by many Mobile-based companies representing shipbuilding, marine engineering, marine technology, and services. As a result of positive feedback and dialogue with these industry leaders, the Chamber has relaunched the sector council focused on Mobile's maritime industries. Partnering with the International Propeller Club – Port of Mobile, the Chamber will host a series of quarterly meetings on the maritime economy and opportunities related to the Port of Mobile's expansive growth, beginning in early 2023.

Mobile First

In 2022, the Mobile Chamber announced an initiative to keep Mobile dollars in the local economy by launching "Mobile First," a formalized pledge that companies will prioritize local businesses in bid projects.

A priority of 2022 Mobile Chamber Chairman Matt White, the initiative was developed by a 16-member committee supported by Team Mobile, including Mayor Sandy Stimpson, the Mobile City Council, Mobile County Commission, the Mobile Chamber and business leaders. Preston Bolt of Hand Arendall Harrison Sale LLC led the team in developing a plan everyone could support.

"We must keep the momentum going as the Mobile area sees more and more large-scale economic development projects announce moves and expansions to our area," said Matt White. "Innovative commitments like these lift up our Mobile-grown companies and make our area a great place to be in business."

Companies are being asked to make a good faith effort to hit specific goals when making decisions regarding construction contracts, capital investments, service contracts and hiring needs. These guidelines will be given to be used when requesting bids for both public and private projects.

Informational project pre-bid meetings, open to the public, are held at the Chamber. Two meetings were held in late 2022, Canfor Southern Pine and Topgolf, both attended by approximately 60 people.

WORKFORCE AND TALENT DEVELOPMENT

A skilled and educated workforce is the most important factor influencing a community's economic competitiveness.

The Mobile area is experiencing unprecedented economic growth with a growing number of jobs in aviation, shipbuilding and repair, advanced manufacturing (e.g., steel, chemical, aluminum), logistics, healthcare, engineering, construction and business (e.g., accounting, law, information technology). The Chamber and its partners are working to prepare current and future workers for these high-demand, high-wage jobs through education and talent development initiatives designed to showcase Mobile as the place to live, work and play upon graduation.

Mobile Area Workforce Alliance

Faced with the difficult challenge of producing a much larger number of adequately skilled workers, the Mobile Chamber formed the Mobile Area Workforce Alliance in 2022 to develop a plan to produce the needed workforce and facilitate communication, collaboration and mutual accountability through regular meetings.

Industry Day

The Mobile Chamber represented the City of Mobile at Auburn University's College of Business and Engineering "Mobile Industry Day" in March 2022. Airbus Americas, Austal, APM Terminals, FBI, Hargrove Engineers + Constructors, Outokumpu, Southern Earth Sciences, SSAB, The SSI Group, Thompson Engineering and White-Spunner Construction joined our team to showcase career opportunities in Mobile.

College Familiarization Tours

The Mobile Chamber hosted familiarization tours of Mobile for college students looking for job opportunities in our region. The Chamber hosted Mississippi State engineering students and Troy University Global Scholar students. In 2022, 80 students came to Mobile for familiarization tours that included visits to Airbus, Alabama Power, APM Terminals, Austal, Innovation Portal and SSAB. Due to this exposure opportunity, one student from Mississippi State University landed a job with AM/NS Calvert while on the tour in Mobile.

More to Mobile

Earlier this year, our team began working with a local marketing and design agency, Hummingbird Ideas, to help create a brand to




recruit talent to locate in our area. We believe that our unique blend of culture, quality of life, cost of living and professional opportunities, should put Mobile at the top of mind for new talent when deciding their first or next career step.

When it comes to live, work and play, there is much more to Mobile than meets the eye. With the "More to Mobile" brand and campaign, the Mobile Chamber will create more awareness about Mobile to talent. We will work to reverse the brain drain in our market. The Chamber will make sure that talent has the resources to connect with people and opportunities in our community. The Mobile Chamber will continue to show talent in every city that there is "More to Mobile."

YP MOBILE

The Young Professionals of Mobile (YP of MOB) was launched by the Mobile Chamber to engage, connect and empower the next generation of leaders in the Mobile region. Our goals are to partner with existing nonprofits to support and sustain community engagement, provide networking events for young professionals to connect with like-minded individuals, and learn from business leaders in the area through professional development opportunities.

Since its inception in February 2022, there have been monthly events, averaging more than 100 young people in attendance.







ADVOCACY

The Mobile Chamber works to better our region by advocating for business through monitoring and evaluating local, state and federal legislation; supporting or opposing actions that could impact the business community; building and maintaining healthy relationships with elected officials by communicating business priorities; and surveying our membership annually to find issues of concern to shape our legislative agenda.

I-10 River Bridge and Bayway

The Mobile Chamber and the Build the Bridge Coalition have been advocating for the new I-10 Mobile River Bridge and Bayway project for many years. In 2022, this advocacy continued, and the coalition stayed engaged with our elected officials, writing letters of support and answering the call to action. All of that culminated with both the Mobile Metropolitan Planning Organization and Eastern Shore Metropolitan Planning Organization voting to include the project on their long-range plans to protect the federal and state funds. In December, the Alabama Department of Transportation declared the project "financially viable" and announced it would be moving forward with the project.

Mobile International Airport

The Chamber continued its work to support the Mobile Airport Authority's efforts to relocate the commercial terminal to Mobile's new downtown airport at the Brookley Aeroplex. A groundbreaking was held in December for the newly named Mobile International Airport. This new airport, which is expected to open in 2025, will shift commercial airline operations from west Mobile to a location that is minutes from downtown and in closer proximity to major interstates and our downtown and industrial base.







Port of Mobile

In 2022, the Port of Mobile, with an \$85 billion impact, was named the fastest-growing container terminal in the United States over the past five years. The Chamber has been a staunch advocate for the Port and the pivotal role it plays in our region's productivity, global competitiveness and quality of life. The Port Authority and APM Terminals in 2022 also announced the fourth expansion of the container terminal to bring the facility's annual throughput capacity to one million Twenty-foot Equivalent Units (TEUs). To accommodate rapid demand and growth, the Port is undergoing a \$366 million harbor modernization program. Once completed, it will make the Port of Mobile the deepest container terminal along the Gulf of Mexico.

2022 State Legislative Session

It was a short legislative session to close out the quadrennium as elected officials prepared for re-election or retirement after years of service. Even with a condensed session, there were hundreds of bills introduced and passed that affect businesses every day. The Business Privilege Tax will be fully eliminated by 2024, saving 230,000 small businesses in Alabama more than \$25 million a year. The legislature also reduced red tape and the sales tax burden on more 2,400 small businesses by allowing businesses to exempt up to \$40,000 of their personal property market value from ad valorem tax. The session provided tax relief to working families and employees in the state. These new laws account for an additional \$87 million for Alabamians, bringing the total amount to more than \$2 billion in pandemic relief benefits.

Governmental Affairs Committee

The Mobile Chamber's Governmental Affairs Committee promotes a healthy business environment by supporting legislation and other governmental action which encourages a strong business climate along with growing economic opportunities. The committee reviews and researches legislative priorities; develops the Chamber's legislative agenda and makes issue and policy recommendations to the Chamber's board of directors.



LEADERS EXCHANGE

Since 1987, the Mobile Chamber has hosted an annual Leaders Exchange trip, a highly sought-after leadership experience that takes a delegation of about 100 community and civic leaders to visit other cities throughout the nation (and even the world) to explore issues facing our region. Strategic relationships with other business leaders are forged throughout the three-day experience, providing lasting value and ROI. Exclusive access to other cities' public and private sector leaders and organizations adds unparalleled business knowledge and insight.

The 2022 Leader's Exchange trip to Tampa was sold out. With 110 attendees, this was the largest group ever to participate in a chamber benchmarking trip. The trip included a visit and lunch at Topgolf Tampa, a dinner cruise on Tampa Bay, a cocktail reception at the Tampa Club and water tours of waterfront developments. The education sessions included topics on bio/life sciences/USF Research Park, affordable/attainable housing, waterfront development projects, minority business accelerator and workforce development.

ADVOCACY EVENTS



Forum Alabama

Each year, the Chamber welcomes our federal delegation and governor to Mobile in a series of events that connects these elected officials with business and community leaders to discuss the issues that will shape our region's future. In 2022, the Chamber hosted U.S. Sens. Richard Shelby and Tommy Tuberville, U.S. Rep. Jerry Carl and Governor Kay Ivey. Nearly 1,000 people attended these events.

Champagne and Oysters

After a two-year hiatus due to covid, the Chamber's premier holiday event returned in 2022. This cocktail reception provides a special opportunity for Mobile's business community to network with key area elected officials, including Mobile City and County officials, members of the Mobile County legislative delegation and southwest Alabama's federal delegation. The reception is by invitation only to the Chamber's board of directors, board of advisors, Partners for Growth investors and the Chamber's Governmental Affairs Committee.

Legislative Reception

The Mobile Chamber's annual Legislative Reception is the best occasion to make meaningful connections with elected officials and fellow business leaders. Members of the Chamber gather to enjoy hors d'oeuvres while networking, connecting and advocating for business. All members of the Alabama Legislature are invited, as well as, all state-elected officials and key area elected officials, including the City of Mobile and Mobile County.

State of the City and County

In what has become a must-attend event for Mobile's business community, the annual State of the City and County sets the tone for municipal and county government as they set out to tackle the important issues that face our region. Featuring breakfast and networking, this 700-person event sets the stage for the mayor and the members of the Mobile County Commission to present the outlook for the coming year.







MILITARY AFFAIRS

Mobile has been a key location for the American military since Gen. Andrew Jackson made camp in 1813 near what is now Royal Street in downtown Mobile. Since that time, numerous active and reserve units from all branches of the service have been assigned to the area.

Mobile is currently home to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (Mobile District), the U.S. Coast Guard Sector Mobile and the U.S. Coast Guard Air Training Center (ATC), as well as U.S. Marine Corps Reserve, Army Reserve and Alabama National Guard units.

Military Affairs Committee

For the Mobile area to thrive as a region that attracts talent and business opportunities, we must understand the trends and forces that will shape our future. Regional military installations, along with their transitioning workforce, are a critical part of our talent pipeline. The Mobile Chamber is poised to capitalize on a high-quality workforce by growing relationships with the military installations in the region.

Through the work of the Chamber's Military Affairs Committee, we plan to strengthen the relationships between the business community and the veteran community. We will accomplish this by developing a network of high-quality employees transitioning from military to civilian service and by becoming a premier location for veteran job placement and business.

Military Appreciation Luncheon

This annual event held at the *USS ALABAMA* Battleship Aircraft Pavilion honors Mobile's military community. The event honors the selfless men and women who are currently serving and have served in our U.S. armed forces and features a keynote speaker and the presentation of the prestigious Gen. Gary Cooper Award. This luncheon is a great opportunity to meet and express your gratitude to our military and share it with other companies that show the same appreciation.

The 2022 Military Appreciation Luncheon held in May had more than 250 people in attendance. The keynote speaker was Lt. Col. Alec Yasinsac, who served 20 years in the U.S. Marine Corps and is a professor of computer science at the University of South Alabama, School of Computing, having been the school's dean for 13 years. Awards were presented by the Chamber and military organizations with recognition of distinguished ROTC and JROTC cadets. The Gen. Gary Cooper Award was presented to Mobile's Director of Public Safety Lawrence Battiste.







ONE-ON-ONE COUNSELING

Business Development Navigator

The Mobile Chamber offers one-on-one counseling services through our Business Development Navigator. The Navigator assists women and minority-owned businesses and supports them in identifying and utilizing local business resources and business development programs. In 2022, more than 160 small businesses were served through the Chamber's small business consults. The Navigator counseling services help businesses grow and succeed. You do not have to be a member to take advantage of this free resource.

COMMITTEES AND TASK FORCES

Small Business Council

Comprised of more than 40 business resource partners, the Chamber's Small Business Council convenes to discuss issues facing the business community, best practices, upcoming events and collaboration opportunities.

Executive Roundtable

This monthly series is open to all Chamber members and features presentations by local business executives on timely topics affecting small businesses. Information to help manage and grow member businesses is shared.

Growth Alliance Task Force

The Mobile Chamber is committed to being an inclusive organization. The Growth Alliance Task Force meets monthly to enhance the awareness and promote the growth of minority-owned business enterprises through increased minority membership and participation in Chamber programs.

PROGRAMS AND EVENTS

Small Business of the Year

Each year the Chamber looks for outstanding Chamber member businesses to recognize and celebrate with the Small Business of the Year award. A volunteer committee confidentially reviews and evaluates all submissions in the areas of business growth, operations, and impact; innovation and entrepreneurship; business strategy; customer service and market strategy; and community involvement. Altaworx LLC, Mount Man of Mobile, and Walks and Wags Inc. were recognized as the 2022 finalists at the Joint Board of Advisors and Board of Directors Summer Reception. The 2022 Small Business of the Year was Altaworx LLC, a technology and telecommunications company that addresses the emerging demand for Voice Over Internet Protocol (VOIP) business telephone systems.

Eagle Awards

For 25 years the Mobile Chamber has been celebrating the accomplishments of local outstanding minority-owned businesses featuring the coveted Eagle Awards. The 2022 Eagle Awards kicked off with the DE&I Forum, "5 Pillars of Business." A panel of experts provided valuable information in the areas of financing and access to capital, legal, understanding financial records, human resources, and marketing and sales. The day continued with the Eagle Expo, where attendees networked with small business owners and companies committed to supplier diversity and inclusion through purchasing, hiring and lending. The event culminated with the awards luncheon and keynote speaker Carla Harris, senior client advisor at Morgan Stanley. Honest Air LLC, SoldByEllisG, and Eagle Hall of Fame Winner Leaf & Petal Florist were the 2022 Eagle Award Winners. Alabama Media Group (AMG) was recognized as the Rev. Wesley A. James Minority Business Advocate, an award that honors Rev. James' legacy and recognizes a company or organization that demonstrates supplier diversity and inclusion efforts and extends support to increase opportunities for the minority-owned business community.





Growth Alliance Task Force Business Boot Camps

The Chamber hosted four, two-night boot camps to provide information and tools to small and minority-owned business owners to better manage their business's day-to-day operations in an interactive learning experience from proven experts on a wide array of topics.

Startup Weekend Mobile

For six years, this 54-hour, weekend-long entrepreneurial competition has set the stage for participants to pitch, launch and grow an idea into a business. Forty-five participants worked over the course of the weekend to build an idea into a business, then pitch to judges

Business-to-Business Procurement Forums

More than 200 people attended the three business-to-business procurement forums held in 2022. The Doing Business with the State of Alabama Forum introduced local companies to state agencies' purchasing officials. This included presentations from Alabama Department of Corrections and Alabama Department Transportation about upcoming projects. At the Doing Business with NASA Procurement Forum, companies heard presentations regarding the process for doing business with a variety of NASA centers, NASA prime contractors and others.

The Mobile Chamber's Alabama Minority Vendor Program Forum, held in conjunction with the Alabama Department of Commerce and key representatives from the project management team, was designed to assist local minority-owned businesses to pre-qualify and register to be added to the vendor lists for these projects. Minority business owners were given the opportunity to meet the design-build team and learn about potential opportunities and the bidding process.

At the Alabama Minority Vendor Program Forum, the Alabama Department of Commerce and key representatives from the project management team general contractors encouraged attendees to pre-qualify to be added to the vendor lists for the project.

SEMINARS

Marketing Workshops

The Mobile Chamber hosted three marketing workshops designed to help companies learn how to use Google products to sell online and setup an E-Commerce website.

Business-to-Business Training

Nearly 100 people attended three business-to-business training programs where they learned the skills and tools to enhance or develop a presence with federal, state and local governments and with large prime contractors to strengthen their company's position to compete for contracts.

Impact 360° LeadHERship

A leadership program designed exclusively for women business owners and corporate executives, Impact 360° expands participants' leadership effectiveness, sphere of influence, and vision to increase overall balance and cross-functional impact on the health, culture, and success of their organization.

T.H.R.I.V.E. Emerging Leaders Reimagined

Ten small business leaders graduated from the U.S. Small Business Administration's seven-month initiative to provide up-and-coming small business leaders with tools, knowledge and access to help accelerate business growth and become competitive in an increasingly global economy.





COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

The Mobile Chamber is partnering with the Mobile Chamber Foundation to revive a community development program of work to serve as an overall framework to improve Mobile's business environment and drive economic success. Once an integral part of the Chamber's business model, a community development function helps the Chamber and Foundation work in partnership with community stakeholder, citizens and organizations to meet shared community goals for Mobile.

STRATEGIC INITIATIVES

Workforce Education

There is an urgent need to attract, retain and develop a talented workforce in our area. The Chamber Foundation will support the Mobile Chamber as they coordinate the work of the Mobile Area Workforce Alliance to implement a 10-point plan of action.

Workforce Transportation

There are many people who could join the workforce but do not because they do not have safe, reliable transportation to and from work. The Chamber Foundation will work with the Mobile Chamber to research, partner and fund both short-term and long-term solutions identified to address this barrier to work.

Attainable Housing

Attainable housing, defined as unsubsidized, profitable housing developments that meet the needs of those with incomes between 80% and 120% of the Area Median Income, is needed to support workers moving to and living in our area. The Chamber Foundation will work with the Mobile Chamber to research, lead, collaborate and implement long-term and short-term housing strategies to support the area's current and future workforce.

Downtown Revitalization

As documented by economic development professionals, a vibrant downtown is critical to attract and retain both a strong workforce and new business and industry. The Chamber Foundation will work with the Mobile Chamber to support and convene existing stakeholders and fund strategic initiatives to implement downtown development and revitalization efforts that improve Mobile's "quality of place" and promote Mobile's city center as a vibrant place to live, work and play.

Entertainment and Recreation

As with downtown revitalization, providing an array of quality options for all citizens and tourists in our area is important to retaining and attracting businesses and workers, particularly young people. The Chamber Foundation will work with the Mobile Chamber to convene, lead and facilitate strategic initiatives designed to improve Mobile's "quality of place" and promote Mobile's city center as a vibrant place to live, work and play.

Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DE&I)

It is often said that "a rising tide lifts all boats." When applied to economic and community development, the prosperity is shared by all. The Chamber Foundation will work with the Mobile Chamber to lead and facilitate strategic initiatives that remove systemic barriers to economic success and create a path to prosperity for all.

Business After Hours is a casual evening of networking hosted quarterly at different Mobile Chamber member locations. 


